TRUSTLAND & TITLE I GOALS

Our goal is to increase scores by 4% for students in grades K-3rd from the fall of 2018 to the spring of 2019. For upper grades we want to see growth on the RISE Language Arts assessment increase by 4% from the previous year's group of students.

To achieve this goal, we will implement the following action steps:

1. Teaching Assistants will be hired to assist teachers in providing targeted one-on-one learning and instructional opportunities.
2. Teachers will be given opportunities to attend professional development and engage in professional learning communities.
3. Teachers will use summer collaboration to plan best practices in language arts instruction.
4. Substitutes will be provided for teachers to analyze data and plan how to best support students.
5. We will enhance teachers' instructional expertise and student learning abilities in Language Arts through increased purchases of technology.

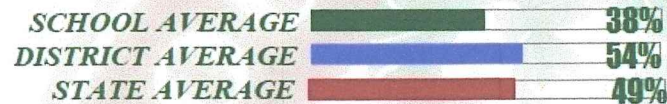
STUDENT ACADEMIC PROGRESS

We have two reporting formats used to evaluate student achievement. First, the Federal Accountability Report and the second, the State Accountability Report. This information is provided to give you an idea of where our students score in relation to other schools in the district at state.

As you can see in the chart above, our scores dropped slightly in all areas, despite our best efforts. As a staff, we are disappointed in the scores, as we do not feel it is an accurate representation of our efforts. However, we reflected on our practice, discussed these results, and have met frequently to develop strategies to improve student learning.

CHOOSE KINDNESS

We have a goal this year to spread the 'Choose Kindness' initiative throughout our school community. So far, we are seeing an increase in the amount of kindness and compassion students are showing to each other. Our PTA has worked closely with our Student Council to formulate activities and awards to encourage our students to discover the value of treating others with continual kindness.

ATTENDANCE FOCUS

Mt. Mahogany knows that high attendance rates lead students to learn more, make more friends, and improve their self-esteem. In order to improve attendance at Mt. Mahogany, an attendance coordinator has been put in place to target students who have had problematic attendance in the past. These students become part of our C.L.I.M.B. program, enabling them the opportunity to set goals and receive rewards for reaching their goals to improve attendance. The school also follows the district's earnest and persistent efforts in working with parents when attendance becomes an issue. Attendance data is also being collected to track tardies and other trends to help Mt. Mahogany know how to best meet the needs of its students.

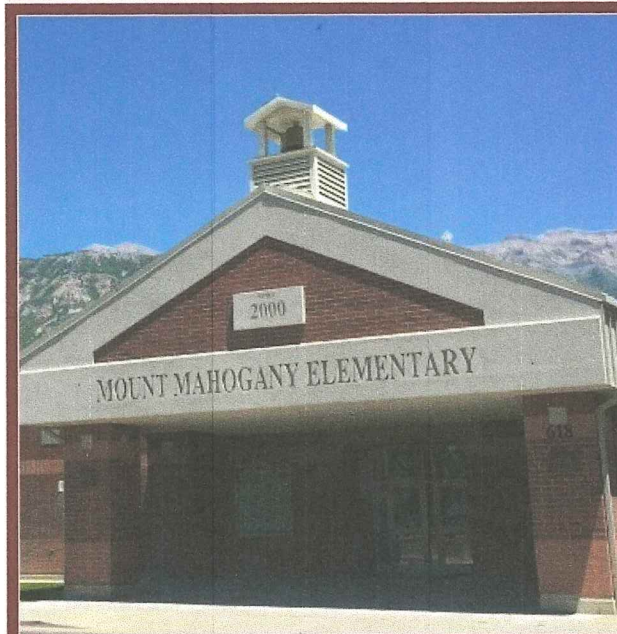
The SCC contact information and meeting dates are posted on the school website. We hold elections for the SCC each August. If you are interested in participating in the SCC, please contact a member of the Council.
